Greenwich 10th April 2014

AGM 6th May 2014

The venue was Painters' Hall which is both a lovely venue and also very central for members to access from all corners of London. We even acquired new members to the committee.



Following the meeting we made our way upstairs to the Court Dining Room, a wonderful room, where we were given a glass of "bubbly" or a glass of fruit juice and we 'caught up' and socialized with friends we hadn't seen for some time. We sat in groups of 8 or 9 on tables, which were an excellent size, allowing communication with whoever was sitting on the opposite side. Dinner was a buffet of deliciously cooked pork or a vegetarian option with vegies and salads, following this were a great selection of desserts – probably most of them good for those on high calorie diets! Throughout the meal the wine flowed freely and the fact that we did not all clear out until just before 10.0pm demonstrated the enjoyment by all. Many members commented to me of the real success of the event.

Hatfield House

20th June 2014

A group of 26 of our members visited Hatfield House on a beautiful sunny day, some travelling from London by train, while others found it simpler to drive.



Following a cup of coffee, we moved into the house for a tour of the 17th century house completed in 1611 for Robert Cecil, 1st Earl of Salisbury, and is now the home of the 7th Marquess of Salisbury. Our guide greeted us on the ground floor to give us a little background history before moving on to see and be given information on the many treasures in the House. We had only started moving to the 1st floor when one of our members, Albert Davis, fell on the stairs while trying to hold onto a rope, he very

unfortunately suffered many cuts and a broken wrist which was established when eventually the ambulance took him to hospital. We wish him well.

The Jacobean House is steeped in Elizabethan and Victorian political history, and a vast number of historical mementos collected over centuries are displayed from paintings, carved oak panels, decorated ceilings and marbled floors, to say nothing of gates at the bottom of the stairs to prevent dogs accessing state rooms and bedrooms. We had lunch in the cafeteria then mid afternoon, some members had to leave, while others enjoyed spending more time and visiting the old palace.

The London Distillery 17th July 2014

Mid July took us to The City Of London Distillery (Gin) - COLD. We had plenty of enthusiasm for the visit and had a waiting list as we were strictly limited to 24 people (2 tours of 12 people in each)



We divided into 2 groups to be given absolutely fascinating information about how the Distillery was opened in November 2012, being the first working distillery in the City for over 200 years, despite over 1700 stills being in use during the 18th century!

As one descends the stairs to the basement where the distillery is located, one is immediately aware of the stills on the right hand side, these are encased behind bomb-proof glass. The surrounding bar area having a very intimate feeling. On

arrival we were provided with a wonderful "G & T" while we gathered ready for our tours. Initially Jamie Baxter and Jonathan Clark opened the COLD, Jamie having enormous experience in distilling gin. Jonathan has now gained experience and Jamie moved on to Leicestershire leaving Jonathan to both manage and distil. He is clearly a very talented individual despite having left school without any O-levels! It is a very fine gin made from the purest organic ingredients from malt to botanicals sourced as locally and ethically as possible, but may lead to juniper berries, for example from overseas. They also strive to continuously lower their carbon footprint to the extent of encouraging local bakeries to use their spent grain. It is an extremely pure gin, hence more expensive than the majority, but avoids headaches following a heavy night's drinking! Following the excellent tour we wandered up to Côte, St Paul's where we enjoyed an excellent 3 course dinner with wine before wending our various ways home. A good evening was had by all.
