For residents of the Ward, the most important ongoing saga is of the redevelopment of Queensbridge House which has now been derelict for over 2 decades & having finally started, the demolition has been more or less at a standstill for several months due to problems with TFL & the City. Alastair is an incredibly motivated current Deputy and as a long term resident of the Ward, is very aware of all the residents desires and the issues confronting us.

One area of major concern is the air quality in Upper Thames Street – Alastair is working closely with the City in monitoring this & interestingly the PM10 levels have dropped by almost 25%, while the NO_2 levels by around 27.5% over 2 years.

He is also ensuring the City prepare for Brexit, and this again, is well documented in his website as mentioned above. This website is exceptionally good and informative, while appealing to read.

City Cruise Tower Pier to Greenwich
